I have and will continue to provide thought and feedback from my involvement in various areas of the Auckland Ice Hockey community (e.g., LTP/Bantam coaching, a Parent, a Player in the AHL, and special events).

The role continues to be primarily consultative, although active hands on participation/volunteering activities have increased despite lockdown.

While much of this past year's ambitions have been hindered by lockdown, I continue to see great opportunities to add value with special events and work with Carl / A.J. to understand more about the governance side of the role.

Director of Finance Report

In the Finance area, we start off looking backwards as the financial accounts provided are for our financial year ending 31st October 2020. These accounts were not available for viewing at the previous AGM due to account and audit timing.

The AGM is usually held 2-3 weeks after our financial year ends and these accounts were prepared by our accountants, went through an audit process, and were signed off earlier this year.

Review of 2020

We had an unusual year as we experienced Covid lockdowns delaying the start of the season and then again in August. In previous years, the Bantam & Junior season is finished in September and AHL finishes in October or early November. Fortunately, we were able to complete the 2020 season by extending the season into November.

This did mean that our Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable were higher than usual as the club had a lot of activity with the NZIHL Showdown Games and league games in October & November.

As the November activity is reflected in the 2021 financial year, this means that the total ice fees received and also the ice time are less than last year. This reflects the cancellation of so many Learn to Play and Super League sessions and the extension of the leagues into November.

In 2020 AIHA received \$76k of Grants, which were from:

In contrast, in 2019 we received \$51k of grants, of which \$25k was for ice time, \$24k was LTP Gear & equipment, and \$2k was for replacing the Women's Rep player jerseys.

The accounts also reflect the many cancellations. The NZIHL season was cancelled in 2020. Instead, there was a 4 game NZIHL Showdown series which was run by AIHA. NZIHF provided funding of \$10k to enable AIHA to take the risk of scheduling these events with the potential of no crowds.

Competitions for the U20s & U12s were cancelled. The Women Rep League was reduced from a summer series to two tournaments. The U15 & U18 Rep Leagues were reduced to one tournament.

During 2020 both AJ & Justin became full time employees. In addition, after the first Covid lockdown AIHA reviewed and increased the rates paid to game officials.

There were other savings as AIHA were doing the funding applications (in 2019 this was outsourced) and the 2020 prize giving was cancelled. The medals and caps given out in November have been reflected in the 2021 accounts.

In 2020 AIHA has written off \$2,767 of bad debts, half of which relates to unpaid 2019 season fees.

After a 2020 season that included lockdowns, gathering limits, delayed and extended seasons, AIHA finished the year with a net surplus of \$14,071 compared with a net surplus of \$24,830 in 2019.

Review of 2021

The significant change was the introduction of the esportsdesk player management system for invoicing the AHL, Junior, Bantam & Representative players. The NZIHF membership fees are now paid directly to NZIHF (previously we collected these funds on NZIHF's behalf) and the debtors owing funds to AIHA at year end has significantly reduced. While the new system has been an adjustment for all of us, it has been a worthwhile change.

The year was tracking very well until it came to an abrupt halt on 17th August. As this lockdown continues, it is likely that AIHA will have a financial loss this year.

In better news, this has been a successful year with receiving funding grants. In addition to the Covid funding received, AIHA has received a total of \$58k from the following organisations:

AIHA General Manager Report

The 2021 season again provided some challenges for AIHA, but we managed to accomplish a lot even with the season being cut short.

Learn to Play:

Bringing new players into the sport is key for our continued success as an association. We launched a fourth LTP session at Botany on Saturdays in Terms 2 & 3 and this session will operate in all terms in 2022. Total LTP registration for 2021 was 178 players, up from 119 players in 2020. Thank you to Carl McIntyre and Wayne Curtis who's continued passion and hard work towards LTP does not go unnoticed, and to Head Coach, Justin Daigle for the great work he does with the kids. Also, to all the volunteer coaches that help at each session.

esportsdesk Launch:

esportsdesk was launched in 2021 as our new registration system and provided a lot of functionality to AIHA that wasn't available previously. Any player registering for a league was able to choose a direct debit payment plan, which was a welcoming feature for our members. Also, at the point of registration the NZIHL membership fee was separated providing more transparency to our members of where their money is going. Thank you to Karen Messenger and Michael Domigan for all of their work with the esportsdesk rollout.

Auckland Mako Launch:

Auckland Mako were the newest addition to the NZIHL in 2021 aimed at providing U23 aged players more of an opportunity to play in the NZIHL at a younger age. The team itself was made up of players from all around New Zealand. The entire process was well worth the amount of work that went into it, and a special thanks to Wayne Curtis (Manager), Michael Domigan (Jersey design, Website, Social Media), Andreas Kaisser (Head Coach) and Valerie Chan (Team Physio) for all of their contributions.

AIHA Online Store Launch:

AIHA launched an online store in 2021 where for the first time, all NZIHL and AIHA merchandise are available for purchase in one spot. The online store is also the main avenue for ticket purchase for NZIHL games. It is a great setup and provides a lot of value to our customers. Again, a big thank you to Michael Domigan for all his work building the store.

NZIHL Focus:

The NZIHL was a large focus for AIHA in 2021 and it was pleasing to see a few sold-out crowds throughout the season. A massive thank you to all the volunteers who ensure the events run smoothly, and also to the coaches, managers and marketing managers who put in a lot of time and effort for their respective teams.

Thank you to all AIHA board members, league directors, coaches, managers and officials for all the tireless work put in to make the 2021 season successful, albeit shortened.

A special thank you to Karen Messenger for who work in ensuring AIHA is in a financially stable position through the challenges that 2020 and 2021 presented. Karen's contribution to AIHA, and all the work she has put in over her time with AIHA has and will undoubtedly set us up for success in the future.

U9 and U12 League Report

The Super League had yet again a great season, all be it, cut short by COVID.

Like the 2020 season, the Super League had four Under 9 and Under 12 teams respectively. The U12's had 10 / 11 players per team which allowed for consistently 2 / 3 lines per week. The U9's had 10 players per team but due to frequent absences each week there were team changes that needed to be done to ensure teams were balanced, along with ensuring team(s) had more than one line on the day.

The 2021 season saw some Health and Safety rule adaptations. The first being the Under 12 goalies must play in goalie specific chest protector to ensure adequate protection. The second adaptation was the inclusion of the banning of slapshots from players. This was to ensure the protection of the coaches and players due to the rink set up.

Another adaptation to the 2021 season saw the introduction of the 3 second beep to signal to the players the end of the shift was near. This saw, especially in the U12's, new tactics coming in to play when the players shifts were almost over. For example, ensuring the puck was left in the position for the next line to maintain possession of.

A huge thank you to Centre Ice for sponsoring the player of the day certificates. The certificates were a new addition this year that were given alongside the player of the day trophies. They were well received by the players and parents.

From an organisational point, the purchasing of new jersey to accommodate the smaller U9's and the larger U12's was appreciated in the operational side. Looking at purchasing one size up from the largest jersey's size we currently have for the U12's would be beneficial.

Due to COVID the National Tournament that was to be hosted in Dunedin was cancelled. This was disappointing as it was the second year in a row for it to be cancelled. However, those players still in the Super League next year who have gone to one in the past are still looking forward to the next one.

Thank you, is a simple sentiment but one not taken lightly. To all the coaches and managers, thank for the encouragement, the tying up of laces, the quick goalie changes, the communications sent, the time that no one else saw and your adaptability on the day was a huge reason why the Super League was such a success. I humbly on behalf of myself and players thank you for your participation and involvement and your valued contribution towards the Super League.

U15 Representative Dunedin/Ōtepoti

Again, it was great to see Auckland had the depth to send both teams down as we had done previously in 2020.

There were exciting games, especially the two Auckland teams facing off against one another. The first round from July the 9th to the 13th, ended up with both Auckland Blue, White and Southland topping the competition with first, second and third respectively. Also highlighting this that there was only a point separating each that really shows the development nationally of ice hockey in NZ.

Thanks again to Jeremy Allen and Geoff Boehme for coaching the teams. Justin Daigle for managing our under 15s in Dunedin and also A.J. Spiller for coordinating all the travel and team rosters for the tournament.

Unfortunately, because of Covid restrictions we could not attend the 2nd part of the tournament that was meant to be the first weekend of the October school holidays and led to the cancelation of all remaining games.

Dunedin highlighted the importance of both coaching and player development, with a national tournament and with many of those that I had surveyed really thought that this provided a turning point for our own 3 team tournament with the lifting of skill set for both and a greater joy and understanding of the game of hockey for both players and coaches alike.

Thank you also to all of those that supplied requested feedback, this has been incorporated into my report. It has been great to meet so many of you parents, players and trainers and a privilege to be involved in a small part in their hockey journey.

I look forward to 2022 in the hope that we reach vaccination targets to get back on the ice.

Junior League Report

Women's Ice Hockey

Women's hockey in 2021 was focused on three main areas; development of current players, mentoring of LTP girls and the NZWIHL.

Development of Current Players

We held three open practices during the season, open to ages 2009 and older. All registered female players - regardless of skill level or years of playing, were invited to attend. Turnout was not as high as hoped for, however feedback from attending players was positive and do we hope to hold more in the 2022 season and attract more players to attend. Several ideas around cost effectiveness have been discussed and will re-approach options closer to the season starting.

Mentoring of LTP

Current NZWIHL players were encouraged to attend LTP classes, in a coach/mentor capacity. This was to provide the beginner girls with a visual representation of what was possible for women in the AIHA community. The NZWIHL players that were able to assist with LTP found that it was not only rewarding for the younger beginner girls but also enabled themselves to enjoy giving back to the sport. This is also an initiative that I would like to continue and grow for future seasons.

NZWIHL

The NZWIHL has only been able to complete one round of the league so far this season. The hope is that the rescheduled finals planned in early December will be able to take place. However, with the current COVID lockdown levels and the cancellation of the NZIHL the round has yet to be officially confirmed. The Auckland Steel progressed well in the first round and are currently in third place on the tables.

Women's Ice Hockey Portfolio

Director of Player and Coach Development Report

Despite the many challenges AIHA faced this season, there were many successes and positives. Here are some highlights:

Preseason Training:

Preseason training had a strong turnout across a range of age groups, particularly the U18 age group. This included both Sunday on ice trainings at Botany and Avondale and Saturday off ice trainings at Glenfield Active Zone. The on ice trainings included skating, shooting, and small area games. Off ice training focused on shooting and puck handling. Goalie specific skills were also included in both on and off ice training sessions. A special thanks to Justin and AJ for their planning, as well as Darren and Michal for helping coordinate off ice sessions.

Holiday Programs:

Holiday programs were very successful again in the first part of the season, with a strong turnout and good feedback from players. Sessions included on ice skills with a focus on skating, dryland training, and circuit fitness work at a local gym. Thanks to Justin and AJ for running this.

Goalie Development:

Sunday morning trainings this season included a new goalies-only session before the start of the main session. Turnout was consistent with a core of 5-6 goalies. This provided an excellent opportunity for goalies to focus on movement, edge control, net awareness, and positioning. This was a great new initiative that will have great benefits for attracting new goalies as well as strengthening goalie fundamentals for our existing beginner and advanced players. Thanks to Justin for spending the time to prepare and plan high level drills for goalies. We are also excited about the possibility of having Matt Canaday involved in the goalie program in the future.

U12, U15, U18 Rep Program:

Numbers for the representative program continued to grow, allowing for a second U15 again this year. It would be great to see this growth continue forward with the possible addition of a second U18 team next year. The mid-season tournaments in Dunedin saw very competitive performances from all age groups.

Additional Pathways for U21 Players:

In order to increase retention as players move out of the junior/U18 age group, several opportunities and pathways were added this year for U21 players.

- Last year's junior players were encouraged to join in the AHL - providing opportunities to play regular games while also adding to the level of play in the AHL.
- The new Mako development team joined the NZIHL, giving U21 players from all regions in New Zealand the chance to play against other NZIHL teams. The roster of players changed from game to game, but included a core of senior veteran players, providing an opportunity for mentorship. The Mako season, while cut short, was definitely a huge success. Thanks to Wayne for all of his hard work with the team.
- The introduction of a U21 Rep league allowed the opportunity for these players to train and play with their age group against other centres.
- The NZIHL junior development program saw a strong core of U21 and U18 players train with either the Admirals or Swarm, with the opportunity to play in some games. This not only provided a high level of training for our U21 players, but increased each team's depth and ensuring the NZIHL teams continue to develop their future players.

Triple Star Weekend:

The Triple Star Weekend, held earlier in the season, was a combination of national level U18, U20, and Ice Blacks players and coaches at one development camp. For the first time, coaches from each of the NZIHL teams were also in attendance. There was a strong focus on upskilling coaches and continuing to model the benefits of incorporating larger numbers of players on ice in the same sessions. Having current

Ice Black players take part in the camp also enabled modelling and mentorship at the highest level for our future All Black players. A highlight of the camp was the Team White vs Team Black game, with each team made up of a mix of Ice Blacks and U18/U20 players. There was a strong representation from Auckland at this camp, which was great to see. Thanks to NZIHF for having the vision to create this amazing experience for players and coaches.

Looking forward to next season, there are many opportunities to build and grow the strength of our players and coaches. Here are some possible next steps:

- Continue to build the depth of coaches in our association by recruiting and 'shoulder tapping'
- Offer a series of coaching clinics in 2022 to increase coach confidence and establish a base level certification for all coaches
- Explore options for implementing a coaching progression framework to build our coaching capacity
- Continue to use regular feedback and skill testing to guide on ice focus, using this to implement a season plan
- Push for video coverage at all representative tournaments to be made available to all teams and coaches as an invaluable teaching and assessment tool
- Continue to build a framework of tactics, concepts, and systems to build hockey IQ among all players at the appropriate age/level
- Promote fitness and strength training as an important part of sport development

Director of Officiating and Referee-in-Chief Report

The AIHA officiating program contended with another COVID-19 pandemic-disrupted season in 2021. As in 2020, the Association provided on-ice and off-ice officials for all games at adult and youth levels.

However, the shortened season also interrupted officials' development.

Numbers and capacity: AIHA's officiating capacity remained adequate despite only very slight growth in terms of numbers. All told, AIHA fielded thirty-nine on-ice officials (thirty-six in 2020) and fifteen off-ice in 2021 (fifteen in 2020) (officials who officiated at least one game during the 2020 season):

- On-ice officials:
 - Adult: **22** (including two new officials) (**23** in 2020)
 - Youth (under nineteen years of age, including four new officials): **15** (**11** in 2020)
 - Backup officials: **2** (Justin Daigle, A. J. Spiller)
- Off-ice officials: **15** (including two four volunteers)

The above figures represent an increase in overall on-ice official numbers but the growth occurred among youth officials, masking a slight decrease in adult numbers. On the one hand, this is good news as youth officials suggest positive longterm growth in officiating. On the other hand, these figures indicate the ongoing need to recruit and retain adult officials every season. The same applies to off-ice officials. The fact that we struggled toward the middle of the season to provide on-ice and off-ice officials confirms this need (the fact that most of the gaps occurred on Monday nights—nights where the third adult league game often started at 9:30pm—suggests the need to rethink scheduling three games on those nights).

Development:

- Training seminar: we ran an on-ice training session on 13 March at Paradise, Botany. The session included four hours in classroom and one hour on-ice. Twenty-six officials attended, ten of which were youths.
- I also ran a number of adhoc Zoom training sessions for new on-ice and off-ice officials who could not attend the 13 March session.
- Development of younger officials:
 - Nine of the younger officials in the U19 age category began officiating U15 games on Monday nights as linesmen. One of those officials also refereed U15 games. The return to scheduling U15 games followed by U19 games on Monday nights has opened this opportunity for these officials, who also play in the U19 league.
 - Two officials—Aidan Todd and Marlene Wimmer—officiated at the national U15 tournament in July.
 - SuperLeague continues to function as the basic entryway for new youth officials.
- Supervision: I supervised eight AIHA officials in 2021 (which involves observing the official during game, completing feedback form, and debriefing with the official after the game). The next step in developing a supervision program involves recruiting other AIHA officials to supervise and to recruit someone other than the Referee-in-Chief to coordinate that program.

Game incidents and major penalties:

In 2021, AIHA officials assessed five major + game misconduct penalties, one for cross-checking with reckless endangerment, one for abuse of the official, and three for unsportsmanlike conduct involving the shouting of obscenities. This figure represents a significant increase in the assessment of major penalties over the 2020 season. The abuse of the official penalty, assessed in the adult league, suggests the need to more vigorously enforce the AIHA's code of conduct in regard to respect for the officials. Abuse of the official stands as the single biggest factor depressing recruitment and retention of officials. The fact that the three major + game penalties for obscene language occurred in an U19 game is especially worrying and suggests the need for proactive steps to build positive sporting culture in the AIHA youth leagues.

NZIHF:

In my role as AIHA RiC I also coordinated the rostering of off-ice officials for Auckland NZIHL games. I also conducted two Zoom training sessions for on-ice officials in the Wellington Ice Hockey Association.

In closing, I would like to thank all AIHA officials but especially Matt Clarke for his work as Scheduler. Thanks also to A.J. Spiller as General Manager for his organizing the monthly payments to officials.
